Do you feel it would be of benefit to you and our community?



Construction of Hempton Church by Claire Travis

As described in previous issues, Holy Trinity Church and Vicarage were built under the guidance of Charles St Denys Moxon, the first vicar of the Church.

However, I wondered who actually built the Church and Vicarage?

Holy Trinity was Grade II listed on 26-Sep-2006, as "an important small rural example of a foundation emerging directly from the Oxford Movement, the ideals of which have been maintained. The original element survives very little altered with surviving reredos, patterned windows, stencilling to the sanctuary ceiling etc". You can read the full entry on the Historic England Website.

New Chapel on Hempton Green.

The parish of <u>Hempton</u> in this County, containing about 500 poor people, has been without either church or clergyman since the Reformation, when an ancient Priory Church was demolished. In order that the spiritual wants of these people may be supplied, a subscription has been raised to build a chapel, and a sufficient sum collected for it. The importance of the work engaged the sympathies of the gentry of the neighbourhood, who contributed about £300. The Church Building Society contributed £65, and authorized their architect, J. H. Hakewell, Esq., to enlarge the original design, and to superintend the progress of the edifice. The present structure can only be regarded as a chancel for the chapel, and we hope, that, as contemplated a nave will be added, in which divine service may be performed.

Nope, has, as concerned and the plan, the building was recently commenced, the site plan, the building was recently commenced, the site being on the borders of Hempton Green, near the town of Fakenham. The building will consist of four rough flint walls, with Caen stone dressings; the roof and belify will accommodate about 100 persons. The style of architecture, so far as any style can be exhibited on so small a scale, is Early English. The parties employed in the erection of the chapel are—Mr. D. Forster, stonemason, Mr. C. Tuthill, carpenter, Mr. J. Antingham jun, bricklayer. On Friday last, the first stone of the new building

On Friday last, the first stone of the new building was laid in the presence of a considerable number of ladies and gentlemen. The ceremony was preceded by an afternoon service in the parish church. A large congregation attended the service. Mr. A. Gaul presided at the organ, and commenced the musical part of the service by a voluntary from MenThe architect was John Henry Hakewell Esq of London. Reading the Norfolk Chronicle published on Saturday 01 September 1855 we can actually see who built the Church. There was Mr D Forster, stonemason; Mr C Tuthill, carpenter; Mr J Antingham, bricklayer.

Presumably they then built the Vicarage once they had finished with the Church.

The article goes on to describe the procession to the new site of the chancel and the service that was carried out with the laying of the foundation stone.

Using the further newspaper articles and genealogy sites like Ancestry, I found that the builders were locals.

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Stonemason:	Daniel Forster (born in Fakenham 1821)	
	Lived in Bridge Street Fakenham with his family. Described himself as a	
	stonemason employing 3 men and two boys.	
Carpenter:	Mr Charles Tuthill (born in Hempton 1825)	
	Lived in Wells Road 'Carpenters Shop', Fakenham, with his family, a	
	servant and an apprentice. Described himself as a carpenter, employer	
	of 3 boys.	
Bricklayer:	James Antingham jun. (born in Great Snoring 1802)	
	Lived in Oak Street Fakenham with his family, near the Star Inn.	

In the original plans of the 1850s it was only the chancel that was to be built, with an extension to be added later. The extension was designed by John P. Chaplin of Norwich. When the extension was built in 1954 (consecrated October 1955) the builders were Westgate & Son of Norwich. To save money, the crucifix in Rev. Leavey's plans for the new south transept was not added. Then in 1980 the Parochial Church Council decided to add the crucifix as a memorial to him.
